Program Note: This excerpt from the evening-length dance *e-Motion* starts at the beginning, but does not finish at the end. *e-Motion* premiered in May 2023 at The Cherry Arts in Ithaca, NY, and online through live-streamed performances, a co-production between The Cherry Arts and Daniel Gwirtzman Dance Company.

Daniel Gwirtzman celebrates thirty years as a New York City company director and choreographer. Since co-founding Artichoke Dance Company in 1995, "a welcome addition to the New York dance scene" (The New York Times), he has choreographed and performed without pause. Reviews from Artichoke's debut concert earned him comparisons to Mark Morris, by Elizabeth Zimmer in The Village Voice, whose company he toured internationally with over several years as a guest. An artist/scholar, Daniel Gwirtzman is deeply immersed in multiple arenas; as a producer, dancer, educator, and filmmaker, known for his blend of innovative and charismatic work. Collaborations blend genres and disciplines, take risks, involve community, promote optimism, and celebrate individuality and humanity. The New Yorker and The Village Voice describe him as "a choreographer of high spirits and skill," and "an abundantly inventive artist with a subtle defiance of gender roles." The New York Times writes "Mr. Gwirtzman does know that in dance less can be more. He can evoke strong feelings with a few gestures." He has been awarded commissions, residencies and fellowships nationally and abroad. He is a professor at Ithaca College's School of Music, Theatre and Dance and contributes nationally to the dance education field through his service as a Board Member of the National Dance Education Organization and as Chair of the University of Michigan's School of Music, Theatre and Dance Alumni Board, his alma mater. Spring 2024 he was in residence at the Dora Maar Cultural Center in Provence, France where he produced the dance film Framing Ménerbes, premiering this June in France and in NYC at the Dolby 88 Screening Room Thursday, June 26 in Manhattan. @gwirtzmandance

Daniel Gwirtzman Dance Company, known for its optimistic ethos, was formed in 1998. Since its inception, it has demonstrated a commitment to education operating with the philosophy and programming that everyone can join the dance. Incorporating dance and story into the film medium has been a consistent practice along with creating original programming for the stage. The repertory has earned praise for its humor, musicality, stylistic diversity, and accessibility. The Company's acclaimed creation, Dance With Us, a free online educational resource, received leadership support from the Rockefeller Brothers Fund and is designed to demystify choreography and increase comfort viewing and speaking about dance. The digital resource showcases the Company's decade-long practice working in the dance for camera genre. Lincoln Center and The New York Public Library for the Performing Arts presented the Company in 2023 during its 25th Anniversary season in a stand-alone program called Everybody Can Dance. In the summer of 2024 DGDC was in residence at the American Dance Festival where it developed its newest evening-length dance Flashpoint. Highlights include performances at Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival, The Kennedy Center, Battery Dance Festival, Fire Island Dance Festival, Bryant Park, Edinburgh Fringe Festival, and Jazz at Lincoln Center www.gwirtzmandance.org

Saviana Stanescu is a cutting-edge award-winning Romanian playwright, poet, and ARTivist based in NY, author of Aliens with Extraordinary Skills, For a Barbarian Woman, Don't / Dream, Bee Trapped Inside the Window, Zebra 2.0, LAB RATS, What Happens Next, Ants, Lenin's Shoe, Hurt, Useless, Toys, and many other plays

centering the immigrant experience. Winner of New York Innovative Theatre Award for Outstanding Play (Waxing West) and UNITER Award for Best Romanian Play of the Year (Inflatable Apocalypse), Saviana has published over 20 books of plays and poetry, written in English and Romanian, translated and produced around the world. Other honors: Fulbright, Indie Theatre Hall of Fame, John Golden Award, KulturKontakt, Marulic Prize for Best European Radiodrama, Inaugural Audrey Residency with New Georges, etc. Saviana's US plays have been developed/produced off-Broadway at Women's Project, La MaMa, 59E59, NYTW, EST, HERE, New Georges, The New Group, Lark; regionally at the Hangar Theatre, Cherry Artspace, Civic Ensemble, HartBeat Ensemble, Know Theatre, B Street Theatre, Traveling Jewish Theatre; and globally at Teatro La Capilla in Mexico City, Teatrul Odeon in Bucharest, Dramalabbet in Stockholm, etc. She was a writer-in-residence for Richard Schechner's East Coast Artists in New York and for the National Museum of Literature in Bucharest. Ms Stanescu holds an MFA in Dramatic Writing and an MA in Performance Studies from New York University, Tisch School of the Arts, and currently works as an Associate Professor of Playwriting and Contemporary Theatre at Ithaca College. She has published over 20 books of drama and poetry. Saviana is the founding artistic director of Immigrant Artists and Scholars in New York (IASNY), and curates/hosts the recurring IASNY programs: Liberty's Daughters - Immigrant Women's Monologues, New York with an Accent, and Global Poetry Series (GPS). www.savianastanescu.com

Sarah Hillmon was born and raised in Rochester, New York. There she trained with Garth Fagan and Timothy M. Draper and was a member of the Rochester City Ballet. She graduated with a B.F.A. in dance from New York University's Tisch School of the Arts, where she had the privilege of performing works by talented artists including Sidra Bell, Lucinda Childs, Gus Solomons Jr., and Charles Weidman. After college, she became a member of Lucinda Childs Dance Company, where she toured the world performing classic works. While in New York City, she has also had the honor to perform with artists such as Solange Knowles as well as a number of dance companies including Robert Mark Dance, Suzanne Beahrs Dance, BodyStories: Teresa Fellion Dance, DanceBoissiere, and the Daniel Gwirtzman Dance Company. She originated the role of Ava in *e-Motion* when the piece premiered in the spring of 2024. She joined Mark Morris Dance Group as an apprentice in 2023 and became a company member in 2024.

Jeff Story, a native of Columbus, Ohio, began his professional affiliation with movement accompanying at Ballet Met and for the dance department at The Ohio State University. In Philadelphia, where Jeff lived for more than two decades, he accompanied and composed for the Philadelphia Dance Company (Philadanco), Pennsylvania Ballet, The University of the Arts, The Rock School, Temple University, Bryn Mawr College, and Dance for Parkinson's Disease. His music was commissioned by NYC's Ailey II. Jeff's collaboration with DGDC spanned twenty-one years, resulting in scores of dances and compositions. Jeff passed away unexpectedly two years ago in the spring of 2022, leaving this earth much too soon.

Kyle Artone (Costume Designer) is a costume and set designer, based in Manhattan. He designs for theatre, dance, live performance, opera, and film. His work has been seen at New York City's; Target Margin Theater, Theatre for a New City, The Brick, Bank Street Theatre @HB Studio, Lenfest Center for the Arts, THE TANK, Theatre Row, The Mark O'Donnell Theatre, Smith Street Stage. Pat Catterson (Choreographer), a NYC and Boston based artist, has choreographed 118 works, receiving many accolades including a Solomon R. Guggenheim Choreography Fellowship, individual grants from the National Endowment for the Arts, the CAPS Program, the Harkness Foundation, the Foundation for Contemporary Arts, the Ludwig Vogelstein Foundation, as well as a Fulbright Grant, and in 2023 she was a Resident Artist at LaMaMa. Her work has been commissioned by companies, schools, and individuals. A dedicated educator, she has been on many faculties including Sarah Lawrence College, UCLA, the Juilliard School, and the Merce Cunningham Studio, as well as a guest artist, most recently at Concordia University Montreal, at CNDC in Angers France, and at Tufts University in Boston. Her writing has been published in Ballet Review, Dance Magazine, the Getty Iris, Attitude Magazine, and Dance Research Journal. For the last thirty years she has been a dancer, rehearsal assistant, and stager for Yvonne Rainer, touring nationally and internationally. A native of Indianapolis, her parents were a professional ballroom dancing team and her paternal grandfather a tap dancer in Vaudeville. She earned her BA in psychology and philosophy from Northwestern University and her MFA in Interdisciplinary Arts from Goddard College. She presented works in the first La MaMa Moves Festival and is grateful to be invited back by Nicky Paraiso for its twentieth anniversary season.

Quentin Chiappetta (Composer) More comfortable expanding sonic and musical boundaries than being confined by them, Quentin enjoys a wide-ranging creative career as a composer and sound designer. He has created music and soundscapes for everything from independent film and television to Broadway shows and multimedia experimental work. He is a favored collaborator of countless artists, including Tony Conrad, Kim Sooja, Shimon Attie and Christian Marclay. Quentin's 20-year creative relationship with Marclay culminated in the 24 hour installation *The Clock*, winner of the 2012 Venice Biennale *no on* exhibit at MOMA.. Quentin's work with dancers began almost 30 years ago. He started out as an accompanist and teacher at the Martha Graham School, and later became a sought after composer for noted choreographers including Yvonne Rainer, Mary Anthony, Igal Perry and Stephen Koplowitz. Quentin is the recipient of multiple Meet the Composer grants as well as two American Music Center Commissions for live

works with dance. Quentin also recently completed a large scale sound installation for the Smithsonian Museum of American History Entertainment wing, and the original score for the documentaries *Terrible Children* and *Vanishing*. Quentin is honored to have been Pat's sonic and musical partner in crime for over 20 years.

Brandon Collwes (Dancer) is originally from Pittsburgh, PA. He danced with the Merce Cunningham Dance Company and is also known for performing with Liz Gerring, Sally Silvers and Stephen Petronio. He currently teaches dance at DeWitt Clinton High School and stages works for the Merce Cunningham Trust. He is also an abstract painter and choreographer.

Mitzi Eppley (Dancer) is a Boston Conservatory at Berklee and Quincy College graduate, Mitzi journeyed here from Columbus, Ohio's *BalletMet*. Her early dance training was extremely diverse, incorporating different ballet and modern styles, Afro-Caribbean, ballroom, and flamenco to name a few. She has danced across 5 different countries, leading her to explore formless studies, contact-based trajectories, social and cultural gatherings, and improvisational collaborations. Mitzi has worked around New England as a self-employed dance artist and teacher, costume designer and seamstress, wardrobe supervisor and technician, bartender and server, and most recently has received her license as a Physical Therapist Assistant. A few of her company credits include VLA DANCE, Little House Dance (Heather Stewart & Dancers), Dance Currents Inc., Vimoksha, DanceNite, and of course, the lovely Pat Catterson. Her production credits include ICA, Global Arts Live, and Odyssey Opera. She looks forward to communing with you through dance.

Louisa Pancoast (Dancer) is a dance artist based in Brooklyn, New York. In addition to Pat Catterson, she has had the privilege of performing for The Metropolitan Opera, Yvonne Rainer, Sommer Ulrickson, Claus Guth, Pramila Vasudevan, Diego Funes, Cleo Mack, Michelle Thompson-Ulerich, Emily Bufferd, Jacqueline Dugal, and Monica Hogan. Louisa's choreography includes *HouseBroken*, -the gallery LTD-; *Pinch Back*, Main Window; Are you not entertained?, The Boiler; and *First in Half*, *Then in Quarters*, Mixily Presents. She has also co-authored "Human-Drone Partnering for Dynamic Dance Performances with Increased Physicality" with Dr. Nialah Wilson-Small and "Implicit collaboration with a drawing machine through dance movements" with Alexandra Bremmers.

Maia Ramnath's (Dancer) assorted occupations include aerialist, dancer, choreographer, aerial teacher, history professor, writer, and NYC walking-tour guide. As Constellation Moving Company (group collaborations)/Constellation Moving (solo work), Maia has been creating circus-dance-theater assemblages since 2010 and has performed freelance with various choreographers and companies including Pat Catterson, Fly By Night Aerial Dance Theater, Lisa Natoli, Molissa Fenley, Hybrid Movement Company, Yonder Window Theater Company, and the Merce Cunningham Repertory Understudy Group. Maia has taught aerial rope and silks at Vital Climbing Gym, Circus Warehouse, and The Muse; and history at New York University, Penn State, Fordham, and Barnard.

Sarah Slifer Swift (Dancer) is the Director of Movement Arts Gloucester MA, a center for dance and performance North of Boston. She has been on faculty at Boston Ballet School, Boston Conservatory, Salem State University, George Washington University, Amsterdam College of Art/School for New Dance Development, Scotland's National Center for Dance (Dance Base). Slifer Swift has performed with several contemporary dance companies and independent choreographers in the US and in Europe, notably with Vincent Cacialano, Maida Withers Dance Construction Company, Caitlin Corbett Dance Company, Kate Tarlow Morgan, Monstah Black and MX Oops. Her choreography has been performed in Amsterdam, Glasgow, Edinburgh, and in New England and has received several grants and awards, including a Massachusetts Cultural Council Fellowship for Choreography.

Timothy Ward (Dancer) grew up in Abita Springs, Louisiana, graduated high school at the New Orleans Center for the Creative Arts and subsequently earned a BFA in Dance from The Juilliard School. While in school he was in new works by Robert Battle, Alan Heinline, Miguel Lopez, Elisa Monte, Janis Brenner, Doug Varone, Belinda McGuire, Michele Mola, and Adam Weinert. He performed Repertory by Jiri Kylian, José Limon, Ohad Naharin, and Merce Cunningham. Tim went on to be a final member of the Merce Cunningham Repertory Understudy Group from 2008-2011. During and since that time he has danced the work of over 30 different choreographers, working for extended periods with Douglas Dunn, Pat Catterson, Molissa Fenley, Dusan Týnek, Tze Chun, Mary Seidman, Young Soon Kim, Alison Cook Beatty, Fadi J Koury, Julia Gleich and Yvonne Rainer. Tim worked on smaller projects with Wendy Osserman, Cori Kresge, Judith Moss, Lucie Baker, Carlye Eckert, Elizabeth Keen, Igal Perry, Sidra Bell, Jules Bakshi, Kira B-Z, Isabella Bruno, Brynt Beitman, Donna Salgado, Bo Pressly, Lily Baldwin, John Zurek, Gallim Dance, Mark Morris Dance Group, The Brooklyn Ballet and New York Theater Ballet. Tim teaches Cunningham Technique intermittently for Lindsey Jones at 100 Grand studio and does a beginner ballet class at Good Move studio in Williamsburg.
