Percussive dancer Nic Gareiss and fiddler Alexis Chartrand meld unparalleled virtuosity with an introspective sensibility. The two artists trace, with disarming spontaneity, their paths across French Canadian, Appalachian, and Irish traditions. Propelled by traditional fiddle tunes and percussive steps, Gareiss and Chartrand explore, with palpable pleasure, the sharing of sounds and gestures, blurring the lines between music and dance, melody and movement. Their concerts enact a contemporaneity of fiddle and dance traditions through the singular creativity of Gareiss' step dancing, and Chartrand's anomalous fiddling on the baroque violin.

One of Dance Magazine's "25 to Watch," Nic Gareiss (he/they) has been hailed by the New York Times for his "dexterous melding of Irish and Appalachian dance" and called "the most inventive and expressive step dancer on the scene" by the Boston Herald. They reimagine movement as a musical practice, recasting dance as a medium that appeals to both eyes and ears. Born, raised, and residing in what some people call Michigan, Gareiss engages many percussive dance traditions, weaving together a singular dance practice marked by his love of clog, flatfoot, and step dance footwork; improvisation; and musical collaboration. Gareiss received the 2020 Michigan Heritage Award, the region's highest distinction bestowed on traditional artists. They have performed in seventeen countries including at London's Barbican Centre, the Irish National Concert Hall, the Munich Philharmonic, and the Kennedy Center and collaborated with The Chieftains, The Gloaming, Phil Wiggins, Colin Dunne, Liz Carroll, Bruce Molsky, Sandy Silva, Bill Frisell, Alasdair Fraser, and Natalie Haas. Nic holds a MA in Ethnochoreology from the University of Limerick and his graduate thesis was the first piece of scholarship to center the experience of LGBTQ Irish step dancers. This research led to Gareiss contributing a chapter to Queer Dance: Meanings and Makings, edited by Clare Croft on Oxford University Press.

Montreal fiddler Alexis Chartrand has traced a singular path across the Québécois traditional music scene. "Known for his pensive reworkings of Québécois fiddle tunes" (Songlines), he has pioneered the use of baroque violin and bows for the interpretation of this repertoire. His partnership with multi-instrumentalist and sound engineer Nicolas Babineau has led to the release of three albums, and to many concerts in Québec, Canada, the United States and Sweden. Hailed in 2019 as "two must-hears of Québécois traditional music" (Penguin Eggs), their 2024 collaboration with Nicolas Ellis and Orchestre de l'Agora "was a revelation and an intense emotional shock" (Le Devoir). Alexis has collaborated with Compagnie Danse Cadence and Productions Des Pieds Des Mains, exploring the connection between music and dance. He has deepened these explorations of folk and contemporary sounds and gestures with percussive dancers Nic Gareiss, Antoine Turmine and Mélissandre Tremblay-Bourassa. Alexis has released duo albums with multi-instrumentalists Colin Savoie-Levac (Rosier) and Cédric Dind-Lavoie (Archives) and performed as a soloist with ensembles such as Les Boréades de Montréal, Thirteen Strings and Orchestre Symphonique de Montréal.

"One day, I discovered a photograph revealing that my grandmother had been a military nurse for Japan during World War II. Later, I watched a documentary about a woman who, like her, had served in the war, sharing long-buried trauma. Had my grandmother endured something similar? I don't really know..." Please Cry is a deeply personal solo performance by Megumi Eda, blending dance, live video, and music to explore intergenerational trauma, resilience, and the lingering impact of war. Inspired by the silence surrounding her grandmother's past, the piece reflects on how unspoken histories echo across generations. Through movement, Megumi seeks to embody these inherited emotions, giving form to what words cannot express. War's trauma is never just history—it lingers, passed down like an unbroken chain.

Megumi Eda's career began at the age of 15 when she joined the Matsuyama Ballet in Tokyo. Shortly thereafter, at 17 she became the first Japanese dancer to be invited to join the Hamburg Ballet after reaching the semi-finals of the prestigious Prix de Lausanne. Over the course of a distinguished 15-year career in Europe, Megumi performed with the Hamburg Ballet, the Dutch National Ballet, and the Rambert Dance Company, touring internationally and appearing in major classical ballet repertoires and dozens of new creations with such renowned choreographers as John Neumeier, Christopher Bruce, Jiří Kylián, Lindsey Kemp, and William Forsythe. In 2003, Megumi moved to New York City to become a founding member of Armitage Gone! Dance, led by Karole Armitage. During her 15 years with the company, she played a key role in creating groundbreaking contemporary works. In 2004, Megumi received the New York Dance Performance Award (Bessie Award), and was named one of the best performers by Dance Magazine in 2009 and 2015. In 2013, Megumi's encounter with New York-based activist and conceptual artist Yoshiko Chuma introduced her to the city's vibrant Downtown Art Scene and the world of movement research. This collaboration led to the creation of projects that push the boundaries of contemporary performance art—a partnership that continues to this day. After relocating to Berlin in 2019, Megumi embraced her passion for creating original multimedia works, combining her expertise in dance, theater, and film. Her recent works include Please Cry (2022) and a collaboration with Butoh dancer Y Yuko Kaseki on DIVINE (2023). In 2023, was recognized at the Pool 21 Tanz Film Festival.

In addition to her work in dance and experimental films, Megumi has contributed to the production side of feature films. She served as the production designer for Nathan Buck's Under the Spanish Skies (2022) and worked as a choreographer on Seamus McNally's Tour One (2024), which is yet to be released. She made her London West End debut in Dr. Semmelweis (2023) alongside Mark Rylance and performed in Madame Butterfly (2024) at the FESTIVAL D'AIX-EN-PROVENCE under the direction of Andrea Breth. In 2022, she also began a significant collaboration with Italian dancemaker Cristina Cristal Rizzo, a prominent figure in the Italian contemporary dance scene since the early 1990s. Their joint piece, Momentum the second sleep / first part, solo, (2022 and on) has been performed at various dance festivals, including the Torino Dance Festival. Over the last decade, Megumi has expanded her artistic practice to include film editing and directing, creating numerous dance and experimental films. Her passion for film, rooted in her early aspirations as a ballerina, has led her to develop interdisciplinary projects that explore the intersections of dance and cinema. Several of her works have been featured at international film festivals, including Endless Correspondences (2022).


