PROLOGUE

Years ago, Jason, to reclaim his birthright as king of Iolcos (Greece) had to obtain the Golden Fleece. It was across the Black Sea, in Medea's home of Colchis (not-Greece). Jason & Medea fell in love. Without her help as a sorceress, Jason never would have succeeded. They fled her home, Colchis; got married; fled his home, Iolcos; & settled here, in Corinth (Greece). They recently had a son.

Yesterday, Jason informed Medea he was leaving her to wed Princess Crayola, King Crayon's daughter, ensuring his succession to the throne. Medea & their infant son to be exiled at day break, a fate worse than death. Last night, Medea sent Crayola a wedding gift, a dress. She put it on & went up in flames. As did her father, the king, attempting to save her. Now, in the twilight, the King is dead. Medea, nowhere to be found.

John-Andrew Morrison (Medea) received a Tony Nomination, a Lucille Lortel Award and an Obie Award for his work in the Pulitzer Prize-winning musical A Strange Loop (Broadway and Off-Broadway at Playwrights Horizons). He was also an Outer Critics Circle Honoree for his performance in the Off-Broadway premiere of Blues for an Alabama Sky. John-Andrew spent many years working at La MaMa with George Ferencz as a member of The Experimentals working on readings, workshops and productions of around 50 new plays. Recently he did the world premiere of 3 Summers of Lincoln, at La Jolla Playhouse. He also did several plays with The Classical Theater of Harlem. Including the Obie Award-winning The Blacks: A Clown Show and Caligula with André De Shields. John-Andrew's work has been seen internationally and regionally at theaters including The Hartford Stage, Baltimore Center Stage, Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park, La Jolla Playhouse and A.R.T. Jason Howard (Jason) is an actor, fight choreographer, writer, director, producer, coder, and driving enthusiast. He is thrilled to be part of the Experimentals founded by George Ferencz who inspired this production as well as a myriad of theater artists. Jason has performed with the Public Theater, NYTW, The Workshop Theater (member), Theater for the New City, La MaMa, The Nerve Tank (member), the Ontological, EST, Circle Rep, New Circle (member), HERE, Arclight, Adobe Theater, Judith Shakespeare Co., Sheen Center, the Ohio, Gideon Productions and is a founding member of ManhattanTheatreSource. He was nominated for NYIT awards for best Actor in 2009/2012 (*Universal Robots/Advance Man*, both by Mac Rogers.) He was named "Best of Performances" in Backstage for 2006 for his performance in Richard Vetere's *Machiavelli*. He has toured internationally doing puppetry with Drama of Works. Co-adapted/co-directed with NYCity Children's Theater. You can hear him on the podcasts "Steal the Stars", "Saturn's Return.", and the upcoming second season of "Give Me Away" by Gideon Media. (incl. *The Diamond Eater*, Tazewell Thompson director), Judith Malina's The Living Theatre, Metropolitan Playhouse (incl. *Anna Christie*, Robert Kalfin director), Regeneration Theatre, The O'Neill Studio. Sally Lesser (Costume Design) is an award-winning costume designer of theater, television and dance. Her work has been seen in NYC, regionally and internationally. Work highlights include the original and Off Broadway productions of *Little Shop of Horrors*, national and international companies and tours; 20 years as Associate Designer on the soap opera *One Life to Live*, (3 Emmy Awards with eight nominations); 25 plays at La MaMa ETC, ranging from Greek epics and jazz operas, to rock 'n' roll theater; *Return to the Forbidden Planet*, off Broadway, the West End and UK tour; Co-designer of *Josephine the Short-necked Giraffe* for Mister Roger's Neighborhood. He is a Writer-In-Residence at Theatre East Writers Room, a member of Cut Edge Experimental Theatre Collective and a 2024 Sewanee Writers' Conference Fellow. He has an M.F.A. in playwriting from the Actors Studio Drama School. 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
